



Description: Barbara Jones Brown became Director of Utah's local Signature Books, a book publishing company that has specialized in publishing the history of the West / Mountain West and LDS Church history. Coming from her job as Director of Mormon History Association, Barbara had a great vision for Signature Books which involved changes to the styles and types of history books published. In one short year her plan has been highly successful. She will share her vision with us on creating and embracing change using a diversity-equity-inclusion method and why this is significant within Signature Books, where only men have previously been the director. We think Barbara's pattern of creating change is something that everyone can use within their business and organization. Discussion will be along the truth of what diversity-equity-inclusion are with an effort to displace and replace falsehoods with that truth.

"Blackface Within Mormonism in Utah in the 20th Century" – Grace Soelberg, former Collections Assistant, Brigham Young University Special Collections

Description: During the 1900's using blackface was a common comedic routine in the traveling shows and local performances put-on by the LDS Church. Grace Soelberg will present the history of blackface within Utah sharing specific shows, performances, and locations. This discussion will include why this is not only offensive, but how it impacts us individually, us as a society, us as a state, and our relationships with one another.

"The Mammy Mythology & the Sammy Story" – Emily Deason, History Consultant, LDS Church History Library

Description: Down through time there has been a gross misunderstanding and misimaging of the Black American woman and the Black American man within the framework of enslavement: that of the happy-go-lucky woman tending all the children and family and that of the happy-go-lucky-ever-whistling man. These created stereotypes have taught falsehoods that have lingered with us as the reality of what White Americans perceive to be real and inspired inaccurate family histories written and recited by slaveholding families and their descendants. Emily's presentation will clearly show the beginning of these falsehoods, share images, and share how these stereotypes have distorted history.

"Utah's Own Negro Leagues" – Chris Hansen, Preservation Planner, Utah State Historical Preservation Office

NOTE: A display accompanies this presentation which will be available from 9:30a – 4:00p Description: Did you know that a separate baseball league existed for Black American men who desired to play ball? Have you heard of the Negro League? Did you know that Utah had its own Negro League, including several all-Black American baseball teams?
Chris will be discussing the Ogden Assembly Baseball Club and their 1905 season and the history of the many Black American baseball teams in Utah that were established between 1897 - 1947. He will examine the turn of the 20th century Black American population of Utah through the lens of baseball, talk about who organized these teams, and why they were created. What was the broader cultural and social construct and history? Chris will take a close look at the men who played ball, where they were from, and why they made their way to Utah and ended up playing on all-Black American baseball teams. These players and teams left a lasting legacy in Ogden and Utah, and to understand Ogden and Utah history one need not look further than baseball history.




